She lives in Huntington Beach, California and has made her home town her favorite subject matter. Her paintings capture everyday life, hiking through the Bolsa Chica wetlands, dining outdoors and walking dogs in Central Library park. It is the artist's strong belief that a connection to your subject is imperative for a successful painting.

Eileen has had a busy career as an illustrator. She has worked in the surf wear industry, N.R.N Designs and Dekra Lite. During all the years of freelancing she always made time for watercolor painting. "I was lucky to have access to such gifted artists as Tim Clark, Linda Stevens, and Chris Sullivan."

While taking classes and workshops she developed her strong style. Her paintings are saturated with bold color and lyrical brushwork. Eileen is now working full time as a watercolor artist. "My formal training as an artist began very

young. My father was a watercolor artist and would take me out on location to paint. By the time I was ten, I had a sketchbook full of my drawings." Eileen was born and raised in Northern California. "I lived in watercolor country: redwood forest, the jagged coastline, and abandoned farmhouses were everywhere."

In 1982, Eileen moved to Southern California to attend the University of Long Beach. After graduating, she made Huntington Beach her permanent home. "While I loved my new home, I was at a loss as what to paint." This changed for the artist when she had her first child in 2000. Her time was spent playing outdoors with her son. She discovered the wonderful parks, nurseries and nature centers Huntington Beach has to offer. "The same beauty I found in Northern California I now see in my own backyard." With an endless inspiration for subject matter, Eileen's future is in watercolor.

TIPS FOR PLEIN AIR PAINTING

Tips from "Aerie Art Garden" – Clonard & Bruce Thomas Studio & Gallery – Artist's Corner <u>www.aerieartgarden.com/artistcorner</u> - Palm Desert, Ca.

GETTING STARTED

- 1. Spend no more than 10 minutes looking for a spot to set up. Spend more time creating the painting, not looking for it.
- 2. Settle in and acquaint yourself with the surroundings. If there is anything that bothers you, move. Make sure your painting surface is in the shade. Close your eyes and take a slow, deep breath and relax. Visualize paint flowing and shapes emerging clearly in your mind. Let your mind explore all the possibilities.
- 3. **TomBo pen drawing**: When you are ready, note darks and light because they will change every 20 minutes. What in this scene appeals to you at this moment?
- 4. Look for what is unique about each shape. Do not generalize. Be specific.
- 5. Design your painting. Placement is important! Remember to place the center of interest off-center. Keep it **SIMPLE**. Don't paint everything you see. **SIMPLIFY!**

START

- 1. Draw the horizon line, and then sketch the large areas (i.e., mountains, shrubs, trees).
- 2. Paint in the sky or the background (i.e., big

shapes).

- 3. Work on down the paper, darkening toward the foreground.
- 4. Plant trees, grasses, or flowers in the ground (dark at the base).

Add sunshine to everything on one (same) side.

TIPS FOR GOOD PAINTING

- 1. SHADOWS follow the shape of the ground and the shape of what is blocking the light. Usually they flow from dark to light.
- 2. Center of interest should have brightest color (lightest lights and darkest darks).
- 3. Don't show detail in the distance. Paint what you see, not what you know is there.
- 4. Paint details last.

Paint clouds with soft edges, blending sides so they don't look like they were cut out of paper and placed on the page.

FINAL CHECK POINTS

- 1. Check light source.
- 2. Make sure you have the middle ground and background lighter than the foreground.

Do your trees or road get smaller in the distance? They should.


Workshop Policy

- 1) The full amount for each workshop is required when you sign up. Your space will not be guaranteed without payment by check or cash.
- 2) The workshop fee includes a 25% nonrefundable cancellation fee (except as noted in #4 below) if a cancellation is made less than 7 days prior to the workshop, unless the spot is filled. Any refund given will be minus the 25% cancellation fee.
- 3) No refund will be made for a NO SHOW or a cancellation with less than 2 days of prior notice, unless the spot is filled.
- 4) For workshops that are 3 days or longer, we require a deposit of 50% with sign up. These workshops are with artists from out-of-town and special financial arrangements have to be made for their visits. The full amount is due 60 days prior to the workshop. A cancellation fee of 50% (instead) of 25%) applies.
- 5) A workshop may be cancelled at the discretion of the Workshop Chair and the President if any of the following occur: There are less than 10 participants, the workshop is not at a financial break-even point, or the demonstrator or location cancels. In this case, full refunds will be given.
- 6) Payment by check for individual workshops must have a current date and should not be post-dated. Checks for multiple workshops and cash will be promptly deposited.
